#### **OUR MISSION**

Family Respite Services works in partnership with families who have children with disabilities. We coordinate support and provide short breaks that strengthen families and contribute to children having meaningful lives in their community.

#### **OUR SERVICES**

Family Respite Services provides families who have children with disabilities a period of relief/short break from caregiving. This is done through a range of supports and services including assisting families to have an individual to care for their child in their home or community, providing supports for children in community recreation and activity programs and care in licensed respite homes for short periods.

Family Respite Services began with the vision of families in Windsor and Essex County. The service is designed to provide individualized, flexible, family centred relief to families caring for children with developmental and/or physical disabilities. FRS provides respite care for children from the ages of 0-18 years in the Windsor and Essex County area.

In meeting a family's needs on an individual basis through the provision of responsive and flexible respite services.

#### This past year our Board and staff have continued to work on our strategic plan.

#### WORK TOGETHER WITH FAMILIES TO FOSTER STRENGTH AND LEADERSHIP.

We are thankful to the parent engagement committee who have worked with some of our staff to discuss ways to strengthen and involve families. This has included looking at and revising the information that is given to families throughout their journey with us.

In the year ahead there are plans to strengthen our network of parent mentors. FRS continues to be committed to providing information and opportunities for families to discuss and learn about ways to plan for a good life in the community for everyone in the family and has been involved in many learning and discussion events this past year.

We have been involved with community partners and families concerning a number of topics, including the development of microboards.

### COLLABORATE AND WORK WITH COMMUNITY PARTNERS TO FOSTER A CARING AND INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY.

We value our working partnerships with the Parks and Recreation departments in several municipalities. Recreation programs provide the perfect opportunity for growth and development, nurturing friendships and community involvement.

Our connections to St. Clair College, Canada Summer Jobs and Scouts Canada also helped us find ways to both offer short breaks to families and build ways for children and youth to be included in their communities.

### CO-DEVELOP WITH FAMILIES, STAFF AND COMMUNITY PARTNERS A RANGE OF EFFECTIVE AND RESPONSIVE SHORT BREAK SERVICES.

We mobilized resources to provide in-home and out-of-home support and Special Services at home to respond to plans with over 1000 families.

As one of the core service providers for children's mental health services, we work with the lead agency and other service providers to build respite into the plans for families and children who require this support.

We have been working at the Provincial level with supportyourway.ca (respiteservices.com) to improve the site to make it more effective for families to use to recruit Direct Support Providers.

The Super Saturdays program was revised to open it to more children at two different centres. We look forward to even more development with this program in the upcoming year. Thank you to the donors that help to enrich these opportunities and programs for families.

We have begun the process of planning for the future physical site of our Weekend with Friends program.

#### BUILD AND SUPPORT THE WORKFORCE OF THE FUTURE.

We have continued our involvement with staff in the Core Competencies initiative, building on HOW we do our work.

We have supported staff to be involved in a range of training and development opportunities.

We are very thankful to our dedicated Board and staff members, the Ministries of Children and Youth Services and Community and Social Services, our donors and community partners and the families who welcome us into their lives.

The summer camp programs provided support for 91 children across 6 community centres.



#### WHAT DOES RESPITE SUPPORT LOOK LIKE?

Most families receiving support through FRS have a Direct Support Provider who provides support for their child for a few hours at a time. Usually they are involved in activities at the child's home or take the child to activities in the community.

FRS also provides support for children to assist them to be included and involved in community recreation programs. These programs are provided in partnership with several municipalities. We also provide support in community centres with the support of St. Clair College students as a part of their student learning.

FRS supports children with a wide range of needs. Special funding resources assist us to support children with autism and mental health challenges. The majority of the children we support have developmental disabilities. Through our fundraising we also assist a number of children with physical disabilities.

Our licensed respite homes, "Weekend with Friends" and the "Spago Crescent Home", provide an opportunity for children to spend a few days out of home.

In addition to these supports, Family Respite Services provides residential support for three children who are in the extended care of the Windsor Essex Children's Aid Society.

Family Respite Services continues to be the lead agency in Windsor/Essex County for SSAH and we offer support and assistance to families by completing the applications, planning respite and personal development goals, recruiting and screening direct support providers through **respiteservices.com**, administering and hiring direct support providers and providing information about available community resources.

Funded by the Ministry of Community and Social Services, Special Services at Home (SSAH) provides funding for families who have children (0-17 years of age) with a developmental and/or physical disability. Funds can be used to provide respite support and to help the child learn new skills and abilities and to become more independent.

#### IN 2017/18, THERE WERE:

- 944 children receiving services through the SSAH program in the Windsor/Essex area.
- 81 children who turned 18 years old transitioned to the adult sector through Developmental Services Ontario (DSO).
- 115 children whose families applied for support for the first time were approved funding.
- 28 children whose families applied for support from April 2017 to January 2018 are still awaiting funding approval.
- 50 children who were currently receiving SSAH funds and who applied for an increase in funding due to changes in their circumstances were approved additional funding. This was a welcome approach that was implemented this year for families who were experiencing changes in their child's support needs.

# SUPPORTING FAMOLESTRONG

### PROVIDING A CORE SERVICE FOR CHILDREN WITH MENTAL HEALTH CHALLENGES:

As one of the four core service agencies in Windsor-Essex, FRS works with the lead agency Hotel Dieu Grace Hospital to be a vital part of the services delivered for children with mental health challenges. FRS works collaboratively with the children's mental health agencies - Children First, HDGH Regional Children's Centre and Maryvale to build respite into the plan for the child and family where required. 86 children and their families accessed this support this past year.



# RESPITE SERVICES FOR CHULPRENSM



The Ministry of Children and Youth Services directs funds for respite care specifically for children diagnosed with ASD. Family Respite Services continued to work with Safeguards Training to provide online training for respite providers for supporting children with autism, as well as providing a training program for families.

#### Y ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE

In early 2017 we began gathering information from families who are involved with Family Respite Services. We wanted to explore with them new ways in which we could be helpful as they continued along the journey with their sons and daughters.

Parents shared what they felt was very positive about the role that FRS has played with their families, but also identified that they would benefit from having an opportunity to connect with other families, that they have an ongoing need for information and that they experience great concern and fear when thinking about the future for their sons and daughters.

Out of those discussions, an evening session for parents was developed. The established goals were to provide families with meaningful information, to plant seeds through the sharing of creative ideas and family stories and to provide those attending with an opportunity to connect with other parents.

Feedback from the parents was extremely positive. All of the parents attending indicated that they had gained ideas and information that will be useful as they continue to plan for their children. Families expressed that it was valuable to think about the future, to hear the experiences of other parents and to make connections with others.

The families also provided information and feedback that will be used to develop future sessions. This will allow us to continue exploring ways to offer support to families as we share ideas, explore possibilities and nurture hope.



FRS maintains a website www.transitionplanningwindsoressex.ca to provide information resources and stories for families and professionals in our community. We also work with community partners to be part of an event called Planning for Success.

To whom it may concern,

I am the mother of a 16 year old boy with autism. With the help of Family Respite Services my son has been given numerous opportunities throughout his life which have benefited us greatly as a family. The respite providers who have been paired with my son have allowed him to strengthen his social skills tremendously. By taking him on different adventures and spending time with him outside of the house, they act as stress relievers and are a great deal of help to the family. Family Respite Services has also strengthened the bond of my son with his siblings through educating them in their Sibling Support Program. They constantly work to educate and inform us of the various programs and ways we can help our son live an easy and happy life. This is done by their many helpful workshops geared towards parents. Through their workshops, I have become much more aware of the many government programs regarding disabilities. I have been provided with so many programs regarding my son's adulthood and journey through post-adolescence. Having never been through this experience before, Family Respite acts as an excellent guide as they are constantly working to educate me on what it will be like having an adult child with autism. Thanks to Family Respite Services and their hardworking coordinators and executives I now have a clearly mapped out plan for my son's future.

# AND DIRECT SUPPORT PROVIDERS

What we hear from Direct Support Providers is that they get so much out of their experience from working alongside a child and family.

Family Respite Services connects caring community people to develop a positive relationship as well as provide opportunities to enhance the child's community participation.

On behalf of the families this year past, we screened 134 potential candidates for the www.supportyourway.ca and www.respiteserivces.com website, to help families find a match

that best fits their child's respite supports. Families were able to view 352 profiles independently to create a link with their family. In addition, FRS sent 636 potential profiles to families giving Direct Support Providers the ability to match with multiple families in the community.

Over the past year, 81 new families had access to this resource and over 700 families have utilized this matching tool since its inception in 2010.



"I registered online and was called for an interview, completed the paperwork, had a very informative orientation process within a span of just 2-3 weeks. #### CANADA SUMMER JOBS

Funding through Canada Summer Jobs enabled Family Respite Services to create 15 summer positions. 14 of these positions were to hire students to directly support children and youth attending summer day camps in Windsor, LaSalle and Leamington. An additional position was created in the main office to assist with managing the summer support funding.

We supported 28 children; including the Teen program April 2017 - March 2018 and the Youth program April, May and June 2017.

The partnership between Family Respite Services and the Vollmer Recreation Complex has been amazing in providing a night for teens to get together. The themes each week provide meaningful activities along with swimming and getting outside to play sports and enjoy the fresh air. The friendships developed at Teen Night continue on outside of the program and many who we have introduced and supported at Fantastic Fridays have continued to come after their 18<sup>th</sup> birthdays!

# FRIERPHAYS

19 children & youth attended the Friendship Fridays program The Friendship Friday program was created to give children the opportunity to play and grow while making friends. They interact through sports, games, and crafts, and also have the opportunity to help prepare and share a snack. Occasionally, they head over to the arena next door to ice skate!

"Friendship Fridays" began in October and have provided support to 19 children.



The Super Saturday program provides a meaningful day of activities for children ages 6-12, while also mentoring St. Clair College students from the Child and Youth Care and Educational Support programs. The children take part in the drop-in program provided at the Vollmer Recreation Complex and look forward to the fun activities each Saturday. Weekly themes, including camping, Mardi Gras, superheroes and pizza party, are planned by the students and provide an opportunity to swim, do crafts, play games and get some physical activity, while spending time with their peers and giving families a short break.

28 children & youth attended the Super Saturday program

# CEDARWIN

We enjoyed another successful year at Camp Cedarwin with Scouts Canada. We welcomed 15 teens once again into the program who were eager to catch up with their scouting friends and leaders, while greeting some new faces to the camp this year. The Scouts continue to bring back previous favourite activities such as canoeing, archery, the ropes course, wood branding, t-shirt making and a talent show around the campfire to keep our teens entertained while wishing the weekend would never end. This partnership has offered these teens an opportunity to experience something they may not have otherwise experienced. We appreciate the time and effort the Scout volunteers put into the activities we participate in, but also the patience and guidance they continue to show us throughout our stay. Camp Cedarwin has become the highlight for our teens and staff members each summer and is much appreciated by their families too.

# TRACTION

The teen camps at Capri Pizzeria Recreational Complex and Gino A. Marcus community centres went extremely well this year! Over 15 teens registered and had a fantastic week, building friendships and leadership qualities. The teens wanted to run a talent show. They practiced their talent every day during the week, and each presented something unique to everyone: singing, hockey skills, origami lessons, being an artist (audience given things to draw). We are sure more magic moments and memories will be made this year too!
